Mr. Foster - Mr. Foster reported that the Township Committee has decided to not continue providing garbage and recycling services. They have issued a notice to residents with a list of options. The Environmental Committee's perspective is to manage litter and recycling and ensure respectable companies are chosen so the refuse gets to an appropriate location after picking up. The biggest concern is if recycling costs too much, will residents continue to separate recycling from trash. B There are approximately 4700 households in the township.
