
#### **Summer 2023**

### ORGANIC FARMING Friday, June 30, 7:00 - 8:00 PM

Joseph Heckman, Ph.D., Professor of Soil Science, Rutgers University will speak about organic farming. If you are concerned about how traditional food is produced, come listen to Dr. Heckman discuss the history and methods of organic farming.

Organic agriculture evolved from a mix of scientific inquiry and spiritual connection with nature. Before there was a USDA National Organic Program, organic farming was more than mechanically following rules for certification. It was deeply rooted in a philosophy of ecology

as articulated in the pioneering works of Albert Howard, Lord Northbourne, Eve Balfour, and Weston Price. They and others ignited a remarkable agrarian social movement. Organic farming methods, modeled after nature, may seem antiquated in the face of modern science, yet they succeed in producing traditional foods for people who care deeply about how their food is produced.

Joseph Heckman, Ph.D. teaches Soil Fertility, Organic Crop Production, and Graduate Seminars at Rutgers University. He conducts research on optimizing nutrition for plant, animal, and human health, and authored numerous publications on soil fertility and organic farming.



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### EVOLUTION OF THE AMERICAN FLAG FRIDAY, AUGUST 4, 7:00 pm – 8:00 pm

J. Richard Pierce will speak on the topic, *The Evolution of the American Flag.* He traces the history of the Stars and Stripes, from its beginning in 1777 to the present day, bringing to light historical accounts that speak of the timeless appeal that the flag holds for many generations of Americans.

Pierce is the author of the book, The Stars and Stripes: Fabric of the American Spirit, which brings together and recounts many stories that characterize the spirit of America and honor the flag that represents the principles on which our nation was founded. It is this sense of history, this reverence for the Stars and Stripes that embodies the feeling of Americans toward their national symbol of freedom and their hopes and dreams for the future.

Pierce is a retired senior banking executive whose lifelong love of the stars and stripes parallels his strong interest in politics and U.S. history. J. Richard Pierce has been collecting historic American parade flags since 1991.

Janine Quimby is an English Language Arts teacher at Ridge High School in Basking Ridge, NJ. She received her BA in English and Secondary Education and her MA in English from The College of New Jersey, matriculated in Drew University's Doctor of Arts and Letters Program, and has earned 30 post-master credits in Education. Much of her graduate work focused on the role of midwives and witches in literature.
