The Farmstead will be filled with the aromas of a Christmas meal being prepared on the open hearth, as historic cook Connie Unangst prepares foods that would have graced the Austen's table during the



holidays.

A must for any true gentile Regency person, guests will have the chance to try their hand, or more accurately their foot, at some simple country dances popular in the early 19th century. These joyful county dances are easy and fun for all ages, no experience required.

Noted New Jersey artist, Deborah Mores will be on hand to help visitors create 19th century stenciled ornaments to take home with them.

Hurricane Sandy Impacts Museums

We are happy to report the buildings that make up the Readington Museums received little damage during the recent bout with Hurricane Sandy.

For several days it was impossible to reach Cold Brook School, which is located on Potterstown Road. The building lost power

and several roof tiles, as well as several trees in the wooded area.

The Eversole-Hall House suffered little damage other than the telephone junction box coming loose on the side of the house.

The Bouman-Stickney Farmstead suffered the most damage. Power was lost for several days.

Several trees were lost on the grounds, including a very old apple tree located close to the garden, as well as a large oak which damaged the telephone lines. There was also slight damage to some of the gutters on the guest house.

In light of the difficulties most of our neighbors were facing, in addition to the loss of power at the Farmstead, it was decided to cancel the program, Civil War Clothing, scheduled for Sunday, November 4, 2012. There are no plans at this time to present the program next year. We apologize for any inconvenience or disappointment the cancellation may have caused.

Due to power outages at the township's schools staff cancelled the remainder of the 4th grade programs, held at Cold Brook School. We are happy to report that all the remaining programs have been rescheduled for May, 2013. In this living history program the students spend a morning going to school the 19th century way.
