Orthography, ciphering, recitation and map making were routine tasks for the fourth graders who traveled back in time during their visit to our

Fourth Grade Travels back in Time to 1828

1828 Cold Brook School. Wearing costumes students "toed the line" and passed a cleanliness check. During their orthography lesson, students proved to be experts as ABC Darians and spelling while writing on slates. They showed mastery of ciphering and map skills by calculating problems dictated by the school Mistress, and scaling a map of the property. Recitation was one of the most important skills of the time period. When a lesson was recited perfectly, the student could move on to a higher level. Educational theorists be-

lieved that recitation kept the brain from atrophy. So in the spirit of reenacting the 1828 lesson, the students prepared a moral verse to recite for the teacher. The students also enjoyed learning the skill of the quill pen. They practiced dipping the pen into the inkwells and forming loops and lines into their copy books. The most exciting part of the day was recess and snack. After playing with hoops and sticks, and tag, the students enjoyed delicious bread with jam and apple cider.
