2013 Open House Sunday Programs

The Readington Museums proudly offers a variety of Open House Sunday programs for 2013, with something sure to please everyone in the family. Our Open House Sunday programs are held the first Sunday of the month, February-May and September-December, from 1:00-4:00 p.m., at the Bouman-Stickney Farmstead (unless otherwise noted). All programs are free, but donations are gratefully accepted.

Our year kicks off on Sunday, February 3 with Historic Chocolate Making. Visitors will have a chance to watch the entire chocolate making process: from the unroasted chocolate nibs to delectable, silky chocolate. Visitors will have the chance to sample 18th century drinking chocolate.

Sunday, March 3 the Lost Arts Lacers will be on hand to demonstrate Lacemaking. Making exquisite pieces of hand-made lace dates back to the 15th century, but sadly today is becoming a lost art form. Founded in 1976, the Lost Arts Lacers of North Jersey, is an organization of lace makers and lace enthusiasts based in Northwest New Jersey. Their purpose is to preserve the art and craft of lacemaking, to stimulate interest in and appreciation for all facets of the history, of the art and craft of lacemaking.

Sunday, April 7, brings a new program- A Day in the Life of Vrouw Bouman. What if you had the chance to go back, and experience life in the 18th century? During the program, visitors will have a chance to try their hand at a variety of chores and activities typically performed in the 18th century. Activities will include laundry and cleaning, cooking on an open hearth, mending and sewing, making small toys, getting dressed, spinning, tinsmithing and more. This handson program is great for families.

On **Sunday, May 5** brewer Rich Wagner will be on hand to show visitors how to make beer, from start to finish.

Sunday, September 8 you can visit with Mrs. Hall as she opens her home to visitors. The **Eversole-Hall House** is located at 511 Rt.

523 (blue house next to the Readington Twp. municipal building). This 18th century home was built prior to the Revolutionary War, and was expanded to become a shoemakers shop in the early 19th century. Come talk with Mrs. Hall, see her home and find out about her husband's workshop.

On **Sunday, October 6** local photographer D.A. Hermann will host a **Photography Walk** on the 65 aces that make up the Bouamn-Stickney Farmstead. Participants will learn different techniques and tricks for taking nature photographs.

Sunday, November 3 brings an Open Hearth Cooking demonstration featuring all types of puddings, including a traditional plum pudding and spotted dog.

Our last program of the season will celebrate Christmas-1840's style. Christmas with Charles Dickens will be held on Sunday, December 1. Spend the day with characters straight out of A Christmas Carol. Watch mince pies and goose being cooked in the open hearth, and other activities.

ing class to be held on Saturday, February 16, 2013.

The class will run from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The hands-on cooking class is limited to eight participants and registration opens on January 7, 2013.

Participants will learn to cook a basic 18th century meal using the original open hearth at the Bouman-Stickney Farmstead. During the class, instruction will be given on basic open hearth tech-

nique, including fire safety, translating recipes, proper fire maintenance and cooking skills.

After preparing a variety of foods, participants will have a chance to sample all the dishes prepared during the class.
